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## FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE

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### 1. Simile

Compares two things using the words "like" and "as"

- Busy as a bee
- Clean as a whistle
- Brave as a lion
- Stand out like a sore thumb
- They fought like cats and dogs.

### 2. Metaphor

Metaphor is a comparison between two things that are otherwise unrelated. The qualities of one thing are figuratively carried over to another.

- Time is money
- America is a melting pot
- You are my sunshine.

### 3. Personification

Giving human characteristics to inanimate objects, animals or ideas.

- Opportunity knocked on the door
- The sun played hide and seek with the clouds.
- The vines wove their fingers together.

### 4. Hyperbole

Outrageous exaggeration that emphasizes a point.

- You snore louder than a freight train.
- I had to walk 15 miles to school in the snow, uphill
- I'm so hungry I could eat a horse.

### 5. Symbolism

A word which has meaning in itself but is used to represent something entirely different

- American flag symbolizes patriotism
- Red roses symbolize love
- A dove symbolizes peace

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### 6. Alliteration

Repetition of the first consonant sounds in several words.

- Wide-eyed and wonders while we wait for others to waken.
- Betty bought butter but the butter was bitter.
- Slither the sly snake.

### 7. Onomatopoeia

Use of Words that sound like their meaning, or mimic sounds.

- The Burning wood hissed and crackled
- The words: beep, whirr, click, whoosh, swish, zap, clang bong, boom, crunch, pow, oink, tweet, meow, etc.

### 8. Idiom

An idiom is an expression that has a meaning that is only known to a particular group of people.

- Kicked the bucket
- Raining cats and dogs
- Bought the farm

### Allegory

a story, poem, or picture that can be interpreted to reveal a hidden meaning, typically a moral or political one.

Animal Farm by George Orwell is an allegory of the Russian Revolution that overthrew the Czars and ushered in communism in Russia.
