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HOW TO WRITE A POSITION PAPER

Rehearsal	<p>Study both sides of a topic that interest you. Gather, sort and Rank Evidence. Based on your evidence choose the position that has the most compelling evidence. Take a position and write your Thesis.</p> <p>Rethink your position, then defend it using reasoning and evidence</p> <p>Choose your strongest argument and plan how to argue it. Then plan the introduction, conclusion, and the evidence. (weigh and rank it)</p>
Drafting	<p>Write an introduction that's</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Strategic (be choosy) • Fair (consider both sides) • Unique (Your ideas) <p>Angle your evidence - explain it fully, showing how it supports the point you want to make</p> <p>Choose words deliberately to set the desired tone and support your ideas.</p> <p>Write a great conclusion Restate claim and its significance, offer insights or connections, suggest future thinking/actions)</p>
Revision	<p>Acknowledge the strengths & limitations of your position. Qualify the conditions under which your argument holds true.</p> <p>Reconsider if your evidence is the most relevant, significant and convincing. Then fully explain how it is pertinent to your claim.</p> <p>Attend to craft such as layering details, using figurative language, making allusions.</p> <p>Research opposing viewpoints. Be fair to alternate points of view.</p> <p>Envision structural choices as sweeping revision. Map your intentions</p>

Conclusion	<p>Acknowledge both sides, and restate or redefined the claim</p>
